Falling from height	All participants	<p>Participants to be kept away from the edge at all times unless secured on a belay system.</p> <p>Participants not to be allowed at the top of any crag unless under supervision of staff.</p> <p>Escape routes to be shown to the participants and this reinforced throughout the session.</p> <p>Walking to and from the crag to be organised by staff to ensure that participants are kept away from danger areas.</p>	Staff supervision and reinforcement throughout.
Hitting head or danger from falling objects.	All participants	All participants and staff must wear helmets at all times when on or near any crag.	Staff supervision and reinforcement throughout.
Extreme weather	All participants	<p>Winter climbing refers to the ascent of technical mountainous terrain in prevailing winter conditions where two ice axes or ice tools and crampons are required.</p> <p>Participants intending participate in winter climbing on club meets should have previous experience on winter routes of a similar level or be supervised by climbers with extensive winter experience. All participants must be suitably equipped with sufficient warm clothing and winter climbing gear (i.e. ices axes and crampons).</p> <p>Route cards should be prepared in advance and a copy</p>	In the event the group get lost or do not return at the expected time emergency services should be contacted and they should be given a copy of the route card.

Hazard	People Harmed	Risk Control	Further Action
		Should be taken with the group leader and a copy should be left with an emergency contact in the event the group get lost so emergency services know where they can be located.	
Extreme weather	All participants	<p>If lightning or other extreme conditions are to be expected the session must not proceed.</p> <p>If conditions manifest themselves during the session abandon and get the group to safety (generally minibus) as quickly as possible.</p> <p>Winter walking refers to the ascent of non-technical mountainous terrain in prevailing winter conditions.</p> <p>Members walking in remote terrain in prevailing winter conditions must be aware of the additional challenges of navigating in these conditions. All participants must be suitably equipped with sufficient warm clothing and winter walking gear (i.e. ice axe and crampons).</p> <p>Members are strongly advised to check conditions and forecasts in order to select a route appropriate for their ability and the prevailing conditions.</p>	Obtain weather forecast prior to session taking place.
Medical emergency	All participants	<p>First aid kit to be readily available, participants to bring their own medications to the location with them.</p> <p>Staff to carry an appropriate group shelter and survival bag in their safety kit.</p> <p>Location of local telephones to be known by supervising staff or mobile telephones to be carried throughout the activity</p>	First Aider will always be with the group

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
